On September 13, 2005, Gilpin County adopted its first historic preservation ordinance. This ordinance could require a stay of demolition or alteration of a structure for up to 120 days.

Since adoption of this ordinance, residents owning potentially historic structures have made many inquiries with the county. In the near future, Gilpin County will create a framework to voluntarily designate historic structure for those owners interested in doing so. Such designation could allow for grants, tax incentives and funding to study, stabilize, restore or even transport a historic structure.

In order to locally designate a historical structure, you must meet all of the following conditions:

- 1) You are the owner of the potentially historic structure.
- 2) The structure was originally built at least 50 years ago.
- 3) The structure is located in unincorporated Gilpin County and is not within the City limits of Central or Black Hawk.
